The Safer City Initiative


- Launched Jan. 31, 2017

Successes

- Employment
 - Publicized incentives for businesses to hire people with criminal records
 - Began conversations with other agencies that assist with job placements
- Youth
 - Two GPD programs: Law Enforcement Explorers, and S.O.S.
- Housing
 - Community meetings in challenged neighborhoods
- Gun Stoppers
 - 34 firearms, 18 arrests, 101 felony charges, 24 cases solved
