#### What is a CoC?

### Established by U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)

**Continuum of Care** (CoC) - Program designed to promote communitywide commitment with the following goals:

- End Homelessness
- Quickly re-house homeless individuals and families
- Access to mainstream programs
- Optimize self-sufficiency

CoC has a governance charter and is governed by a Board

- CoC Application for HUD funding
- Apply for Planning funds on behalf of CoC
- Other duties as outlined in governance charter
- Best practice Unit of local government

#### **Annual RFP – Focusing on Priorities**

- Issued annual Request for Proposal in January 2020.
  - Funding priorities meeting w/CoC December 2, 2019
  - Review meeting CoC Chair January 7, 2020
  - Information workshop w/CoC January 9, 2020
  - Information workshop w/agencies January 23, 2020
- 2. RFP modifications to move toward Housing First
  - Transitional Housing \$25,000 cap on proposals that provide direct housing benefit, but do not use housing first.
  - Supportive Services 15% cap on supportive services proposals.
- 3. Agencies submitted Letters of Intent due January 17, 2020
