What is a CoC?

Established by U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)

Continuum of Care (CoC) - Program designed to promote communitywide commitment with the following goals:

- End Homelessness
- Quickly re-house homeless individuals and families
- Access to mainstream programs
- Optimize self-sufficiency

CoC has a governance charter and is governed by a Board

What is a Collaborative Applicant?

The eligible applicant designated by the Continuum of Care (CoC) to collect and submit:

- CoC Registration
- CoC Application for HUD funding
- Apply for Planning funds on behalf of CoC
- Other duties as outlined in governance charter
- Best practice – Unit of local government

Annual RFP – Focusing on Priorities

1. Issued annual Request for Proposal in January 2020.
 - Funding priorities meeting w/CoC – December 2, 2019
 - Review meeting – CoC Chair – January 7, 2020
 - Information workshop w/CoC – January 9, 2020
 - Information workshop w/agencies – January 23, 2020
2. RFP modifications to move toward Housing First
 - Transitional Housing - \$25,000 cap on proposals that provide direct housing benefit, but do not use housing first.
 - Supportive Services – 15% cap on supportive services proposals.
3. Agencies submitted Letters of Intent due - January 17, 2020
