To provide a comprehensive summary of the relevant events associated with what has come to be known as the "Greensboro Massacre" on November 3, 1979, to recognize the many of the changes that have occurred at the City of Greensboro, to apologize for whatever the City may have done or not done in connection with those events and to provide a scholarship in memory of each of the lives lost as a result of the Greensboro Massacre which will incentivize research on the issues of racial and social justice that help this community reconcile the remaining vestiges of the events of November 3, 1979 and that may even help city officials understand these issues in the context of future events in this community and around the nation.
